It was Helen Putnam's idea, and you just need one person with an idea to get things started. Everyone was shocked and outraged by the September 11th tragedy, and Helen decided to do something about it. She called her neighbors on Shadowhawk Way and Woodwren Road on September 12th and suggested that they get together to remember the people who died at the World Trade Center. She asked each person to bring a candle and to meet in front of her home around five p.m. "It was a spur of the moment thing, and I didn't know how many people would show up. When I called, I got a number of machines responding, so I wasn't that hopeful."
